A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

I have just completed my third full year as President and CEO of the Middle Michigan Development Corporation and am very pleased to present our 2018 Annual Report!

We have included our Mission and Vision statements and our recently updated Strategic Plan on the inside front cover. The inside back cover lists our current Executive Committee and updated Board of Directors. The back cover includes some screen shots from our website which you can check out at mmdc.org.

Inside, we have included some major "good news" stories focused on business expansions at American Mitsuba and Bandit Industries as well as the retention of Unified Brands in our area. There also are many other great success stories that are detailed in the coming pages. Key metrics for the year also are highlighted in the box below. We made 157 company visits and 302 company assists while the companies we work with have reported 299 new hires and over \$34.7 million in new investment!

We continued this year to look at various aspects of economic development with our highly successful speaker series for our quarterly meetings. Our speakers included:

2018 was an incredible year for grants! MMDC was awarded \$100,000, the largest grant we have ever

received, from MEDC's Michigan Defense Center. The focus of this grant is to increase the number of companies in our area pursuing opportunities within the Defense and Homeland Security sectors.

We also received two grants from the East Michigan Council of Governments (EMCOG). The first EMCOG grant was for \$12,262 to partner with Greater Gratiot Development, Inc. for a study on the need to upgrade US-127 to a full expressway and whether this change would positively impact economic development and public safety. The second EMCOG grant was for \$16,000 to assist neighboring rural counties to achieve "best practices" in preparing their available sites for new businesses.

I want to remind our readers that MMDC by itself doesn't create jobs, but we do provide essential services to area businesses who do. We would not be successful in our efforts without the strong support of great board members and area business leaders. We are looking forward to another successful economic development year in 2019!

BUSINESS EXPANSIONS ON THE RISE

In 2018, we continued to provide business expansion support to our companies in Clare and Isabella Counties. These services often include assistance to secure Industrial Property Tax Abatements for various expansion projects. In addition, we coordinate with the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), local municipalities and other community partners to make sure these projects move forward. This assistance is often a determining factor for whether the expansion took place here locally or at another facility located in another state.

AMERICAN MITSUBA RECEIVES A BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT GRANT

With MMDC's assistance, American Mitsuba Corporation (AMC) received a \$360,000 Business Development Grant from the MEDC to ensure their business expansion would take place here rather than at their Bardstown, Kentucky location. The City of Mt. Pleasant also approved an Industrial Property Tax Abatement in September as part of this incentive package. As a result, AMC is planning to add up to 45 new jobs and \$13 million dollars of new investment to their Mt. Pleasant facility.

"Without MMDC, our expansion may have occurred at our Kentucky plant, not here in Mt. Pleasant," says David Stevens, Senior Vice President of American Mitsuba Operations. "Jim McBryde was able to not only get our request for a Business Development grant on MEDC's radar, but also was able to leverage his relationships in Lansing to get support for this project. I understand this is one of the few times in MEDC history that an initial no to a Business Development grant was turned around to a yes. This couldn't have happened without Middle Michigan Development Corporation's direct involvement."

"Jim McBryde and the entire MMDC team have shown that they are dedicated to ensuring all businesses in Clare and Isabella have access to funding and opportunity often only larger communities receive," David Kurtycz, MEDC's Business Development Project Manager shared. "Because of Jim's tenacity, American Mitsuba received a Business Development grant that will truly benefit the community they are located in."

This is the first ever MEDC Business Development grant that has been received by a company in Clare or Isabella counties. It required multiple conversations and months of coordination between American Mitsuba, MMDC, the City of Mount Pleasant and the MEDC to ensure that this grant went through.

UNIFIED BRANDS STAYS AND EXPANDS WITH MMDC FINANCIAL AND INCENTIVE PACKAGE ASSISTANCE

In 2018, Unified Brands announced plans for restructuring their manufacturing footprint, as some of the company's operations would be moving to Mississippi. Prior to the announcement, Jim McBryde had the opportunity to speak directly with executives from Unified Brands' Atlanta headquarters. During these conversations, Jim made it clear that he believed the company would continue to benefit from the superior level of workmanship present in the workforce here in Middle Michigan.

According to Jim, "Unified Brands leadership must agree, as they made the decision to sustain their more highly custom refrigeration and kitchen ventilation products at their Weidman location".

MMDC also will be working closely with Unified Brands to pursue Industrial Property Tax Abatements in 2019 for building improvements through Broomfield Township and the Michigan Department of Treasury. Recognition of our workforce and the potential tax abatements have encouraged the company to maintain their presence in Isabella County and to make investments of over \$2 million to upgrade their facilities in the upcoming years.

BANDIT INDUSTRIES INC. RECEIVES APPROVAL FOR TWO INDUSTRIAL PROPERTY TAX ABATEMENTS WITH MMDC ASSISTANCE

2018 brought not one, but two, expansion projects for Bandit Industries, Inc. Working closely with the MMDC team, Bandit was able to receive an Industrial Property Tax Abatement for each of their two facility expansions in Broomfield Township.

Bandit relied on MMDC to coordinate efforts with the Broomfield Township Board and Michigan Department of Treasury to get these tax abatements approved. Both were approved by Broomfield Township and the Michigan Department of Treasury in the second half of 2018 resulting in \$1,226,942 in new investments in their facilities and approximately 25-30 new jobs over the next two years.

Middle Michigan Development Corporation worked very closely with us through the whole process of applying for both industrial property tax abatements as we expanded our business. Jim McBryde and Kati Mora walked us through each step and coordinated efforts with Broomfield Township and the Department of Treasury to ensure success. We are very thankful for the support of MMDC.

AREA CONSORTIUMS RECEIVE OVER \$2.6 MILLION IN MARSHALL PLAN INNOVATIVE GRANT FUNDING

In 2018, Middle Michigan Development Corporation collaborated with two area consortiums seeking grant funding from the Michigan Department of Talent and Economic Development (TED) to establish sustainable career pipelines in our area schools. Out of about 90 consortiums that applied, only nine received grant funding and both the Clare-Gladwin and Gratiot-Isabella consortiums were among them for a combined total of \$2,615,611! The Clare-Gladwin group is known as the Middle Michigan Professional Trades Talent Consortium and the Gratiot-Isabella group is known as the Central Michigan Talent Consortium.

The Marshall Plan for Talent was first introduced at MMDC's July Quarterly Breakfast by our special guest speaker Roger Curtis, Director of TED. The Marshall Plan is an innovative program designed to bring together students, educators, business and industry partners, post-secondary institutions, economic development and workforce development organizations to collaborate and bridge gaps between our schools and the business community to foster career development and lifelong learning.

The work put into earning this grant was unlike anything any of us had seen. As the convener of our Talent Consortium, Jim McBryde was the point person to make sure all stakeholders were at the table and had a voice in the grant application. For four months, we collaborated with nearly 30 local organizations – schools, businesses, colleges and universities, our state legislators, non-profits and many other entities. And it was worth every ounce of effort to be able to better prepare our local kids for careers they will love.

- Sheryl Presler, Clare-Gladwin RESD Superintendent Funding can be utilized for curriculum creation, project-based certification programs, equipment, full-time staff, industry mentors, professional development, competency-based pilot programs, cyber-security initiatives, career navigators and teacher shortage relief programs. About 14,000 area students will be impacted by this funding and as a result, our school districts will be able to better prepare students and adults for the careers of tomorrow.

Each consortium plans to use the funds a bit differently, but both have a strong emphasis on placing career navigators in schools to assist students in discovering which career paths make the most sense for them. Our area talent consortiums also include a variety of local partners, all of which are listed on the next page. The Middle Michigan Professional Trades Consortium (Clare-Gladwin) will focus on career pathways in manufacturing by training students for jobs as automotive mechanics, technicians and diesel engine specialists. The Consortium will use the National Coalition of Certification Centers Inc. to certify students with an industry recognized portable certification at the new CTE Automotive and Diesel Technology Lab Clare County. The grant funds also will be used to purchase modern equipment and technology for the Clare lab as well as updating the current automotive lab in Gladwin County. The Consortium also will be hiring two career navigators and establishing an educator externship program.

The Central Michigan Talent Consortium (Gratiot-Isabella) will target career pathways for Manufacturing/Professional Trades and Healthcare as the industries with the highest wages and highest demand in the region. This unique focus on healthcare is due to the close proximity of Central Michigan University's medical school, Mid Michigan College's healthcare programs and the presence of two different hospital systems in Mt. Pleasant. The Consortium will focus on creating a workplace citizenship curriculum, developing a career navigation system with career pathway planning, promotion and awareness.

As the convener of the Central As the convener of the Centra Michigan Talent Consortium, I was delighted to have MMDC heavily involved. Jim McBryde's presence as a member of the Talent Consortium was crucial as he was able to provide a clear and confident voice to both the process and the plans for our proposal. His role with MMDC and its work in supporting economic development provided a great context from which to develop our proposal. I am sure that having such a comprehensive Talent Consortium with members like Jim was critical in getting our proposal approved.

MIDDLE MICHIGAN SECURES \$100,000 GRANT FROM THE MICHIGAN DEFENSE CENTER

MMDC was one of only four organizations across the State of Michigan to receive a Defense Industry Growth Area Grant in 2018. This \$100,000 grant is designed to support growth in the Defense and Homeland Security sectors in Isabella, Clare, Arenac, Gladwin and Gratiot counties through federal contracting opportunities. These funds will allow us to connect with companies in the region and identify unique opportunities that support business growth and development in these sectors.

According to Jim McBryde, MMDC President/CEO, "This is a fantastic opportunity for us to showcase the businesses and manufacturers located within our region. Additionally, we will get the chance to provide greater assistance to area businesses and help them diversify their customer base and provide new markets for the products they manufacture."

Over the course of 2019, the MMDC team along with our recently hired Rural Specialist/ Field Coordinator, Brian Roberts, will work in our two counties and collaboratively with Arenac, Gladwin and Gratiot counties along with the Region 5 Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) office to establish the following objectives:

- Create a database featuring companies within the five-county region in order to better match them with opportunities across Defense and Homeland Security sectors.
- Identify companies interested in pursuing these types of opportunities and assessing their familiarity within the defense industry.
- Coordinate with our community partners, including the Central Michigan University Research Corporation (CMURC), to highlight high-tech industries specifically within the five counties.

We are so pleased that Middle Michigan Development Corporation pursued this grant. We have been looking for an economic development partner in Region 5 that we can work with to support Michigan's businesses interested in growth within the Department of Defense and Department of Homeland Security industry growth sectors.

Morbark Acquires Second Company to Secure Future Growth

The purchase of this company, finalized in December 2018, will continue to enhance Morbark's strategic mission of broadening the range of tree care products and industrial equipment, aftermarket parts and service they offer to their customers.

Middle Michigan Hosts Two Site Consultant Visits

Working collaboratively with the MEDC and Great Lakes Bay Region, we were able to host two site consultant visits over the past year. On our first site consultant visit with Paige Webster of Webster Global Site Selectors, we visited the Clare North and South Industrial Parks and the CMURC Mt. Update on US-127 Project

Last year we completed a study on the 16-mile stretch of highway located between Ithaca and St. Johns in partnership with Greater Gratiot Development, Inc. (GGDI). Jim McBryde, President and CEO of MMDC, and Jim Wheeler, President of GGDI, have presented the study findings at association meetings across the state and have proposed action steps designed to minimize the risk of accidents and improve economic development opportunities by prioritizing updates along this section of US-127.

In November 2018, MDOT permanently closed the Bagley Road crossing, which was one of the most dangerous intersections in the state. This closure was at least partly due to the increased focus on the current roadway and the need to improve this road to a limited access expressway. MMDC and GGDI will continue to work together to make this roadway safer and more conducive to economic development.

Flex Tech High School Offers Additional Talent Solutions

The Flex Tech High School in Shepherd welcomed its first class of ninth and tenth grade students in 2018. Emphasizing projectbased learning, one of Flex Tech's primary initiatives is to ensure students learn not only the required fundamentals, but develop solution-based skills necessary to succeed along the career path each student chooses. To help students identify which career



path best suits them, Flex Tech partners with local businesses to highlight a variety of career options to its students in order to ensure students find careers they are well-suited for.
